We have been spending the last few Sundays looking at the book of Daniel, a story of faith, of courage under oppression, a story of obedience even when you're far from home .Daniel helps us to have courage to know who we are, to let God use us as we are, and to stand courageously for God. King Nebuchadnezzar and his son Belshazzar have shown us it takes courage to admit you're wrong, and how pride and defiance brought down their kingdom. Now we come to the story of Daniel in the Lions' Den. It has been called the "one of the best loved stories in the Bible." Kids love it; you probably heard this story in Sunday School, and it might be the only thing you remember about Daniel. I looked online, and you can buy all kinds kids' stuff about this story, veggie tales, action figures, books, cuddly lion stuffed toys – and that's because this story has everything - danger, adventure, suspense, and a really cool ending.

This story appeals to adults as well. Many of us love lions, they are so majestic and powerful. And they are dangerous - back in 1898 two male lions stalked a railroad construction crew in Uganda. and were believed to have killed about 135 victims. There is a book and movie about these lions - called "The Ghost and the Darkness", and you can see these lions now, stuffed, at the Field Museum in Chicago. Throughout history and as recently as August of 2020, people have been killed by lions, they really are dangerous animals. Now lions don't ordinarily kill people, but if there's nothing else to eat, they might eat you. In Babylon, kings kept a few hungry lions around to deal with troublemakers.

While Daniel and the lion's den is a familiar story, have you ever wondered why this in the Bible? Why did God put it here for us to read thousands of years later? I believe God knows that Daniel isn't the only one who will face lions. There are many lions out there right now, in families and friendships, in business and school, in politics and medicine, you never know who is going to growl, who is stalking you, who will be on the attack. We need this story, we need Daniel's example to inspire us hold on to our integrity when we face dangers in our lives, and we need this story when we faced our anxieties and worries.

So how are you doing with worry? I don't have to ask, I know how worried, anxious, and concerned many of you are with pain, uncertainty, and chaos. How do you feel when someone tells you to stop worrying? It is easy to tell someone don't worry, but we know it's very hard to do. But worrying doesn't help when you face your lions. In Matthew 6:27 Jesus asks in the Sermon on the Mount - Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life? Worry won't add to your life, it will more likely shorten it! Don't worry, it sounds simple enough, but can you stop worrying, stop being afraid? How do you stop the panic when you feel like your world is falling apart? That's what happened to our friend Daniel, his world did fall apart. For nearly 70 years he'd survived and thrived as a Jewish exile in Babylon, and was a trusted and respected adviser to King Nebuchadnezzar. But all that ended when the Persian army invaded Babylon, and a new king took charge. But as it turned out, the new king liked Daniel, and as before, others in the kingdom were jealous of him. They were envious of the attention the new ruler gave Daniel, of the promotion given to this foreigner, this exile, this outsider, so Daniel's enemies tried to discredit him before his new employer. In the business of running Babylon, Daniel's job was in jeopardy, but it didn't seem to bother Daniel. He didn't worry, and he found peace in the midst of pain, uncertainty, and chaos.

The book of Daniel inspires courage in challenging times, courage to face whatever the lions are in your life, that we can be people of courage due to the sovereignty of God. Courage comes from the heart, and when our hearts and minds align with God, we can fear less and be fearless. Here's Daniel's story: Daniel 6:1-2 It pleased Darius to appoint 120 satraps to rule throughout the kingdom, with three administrators over them, one of whom was Daniel. The satraps were made accountable to them so that the king might not suffer loss.

So Daniel's old boss is gone, replaced by King Darius in a hostile take-over bid. God allowed Persia to conquer Babylon due to the defiance and irreverence of King Belshazzar. In business terms, King Darius reorganized the company. There were 120 supervisors, or satraps, who answer to three top executive administrators, and one of them is the foreigner, the aged exile, Daniel. Promotions can happen when a person knows who they are in the Lord, when they allow God to use them as they are. People of integrity, honesty, people with a great work ethic do get noticed. And that's Daniel, he never loses his faith, he seeks to glorify God, and he credits God with his successes. Daniel respected the rulers he has served as a captive in Babylon, and in turn, he earns their respect. The new boss, King Darius, noticed Daniel, and that aroused jealousy.

Daniel 6:3 Now Daniel so distinguished himself among the administrators and the satraps by his exceptional qualities that the king planned to set him over the whole kingdom. At this, the administrators and the satraps tried to find grounds for charges against Daniel in his conduct of government affairs, but they were unable to do so. They could find no corruption in him, because he was trustworthy and neither corrupt nor negligent. Finally these men said, "We will never find any basis for charges against this man Daniel unless it has something to do with the law of his God."

In other words, the king wanted to make Daniel the Chief Executive Officer over the whole company because Daniel excelled, going above and beyond what was expected of him, every time, and with humility, not to step up and over anyone, but to serve his God and help his people. And his co-workers didn't like that.

How do you do your work? Do you go above and beyond what is expected? Or do you do the bare minimum, just enough so you don't lose your job? Daniel always did more, and it won him the respect of kings! But it also made his fellow-workers jealous. Have you experienced jealousy in your workplace? We might like to think our business, church, school, office, team is above all that. And maybe you are one of the fortunate ones who've never dealt with employment conflicts. But scripture is full of people who are jealous, starting with Adam and Eve's son Cain who was jealous of his brother Abel, jealousy happens in churches and among pastors. I saw this right away in day 2 of seminary orientation - we were instructed to not hide research materials or library books so another seminarian couldn't use them. Jealousy, envy, competitiveness gone wrong, can be found anywhere.

The other administrators were jealous because Daniel, the outsider, was shown favor – again. Maybe they hoped a new regime would demote this man who had been so influential over Nebuchadnezzar. So the administrators try to dig up some dirt on Daniel. Surely anyone who had been in Babylon politics all of these years would have some secrets, some flaws they could exploit. But they find nothing – no sexual immorality, no embezzling, no betrayals, no lies, no palace intrigue. Daniel was untouchable, he was an honest and blameless man. So the administrators conspire to take Daniel down – he refused to be corrupted, so they attack his faith in God. That's how small these men were and that's what jealousy will do, it makes us mean, small, less than God created us to be. So these men decided to use Daniel's faith as an excuse to attack him. And maybe you've been like them— maybe you've attacked a co-worker or a fellow Christian out of envy or jealousy, coveting what they have, the respect they have earned, the depth of their faith. Or maybe you've been there, attacked because you stood for Christ, objected to the racist comment at work, didn't laugh at the lewd joke in the cafeteria, wouldn't overlook the cheating at the job site. Christians can be attacked when they stand in faith for God. Christians can face the lions of gossip, backbiting, rumor mongering, because they choose to remain with Christ, and do what Jesus would do.

So these jealous men hatch a plan to bring Daniel down. They get King Darius to agree that for the next 30 days, anyone who prays to any god or man other than King Darius, should be fed to the lions. These administrators are good – what a way to flatter the new boss, he's the man, and if anyone disagrees, they are eliminated. The thing is, the laws of Babylon were such that once made, once they were written, they could not be broken or altered. The administrators had Daniel where they wanted him – either he would break the law and be killed, or he would keep the law and lose his integrity.

Daniel 6:10 Now when Daniel learned that the decree had been published, he went home to his upstairs room where the windows opened toward Jerusalem. Three times a day he got down on his knees and prayed, giving thanks to his God, just as he had done before.

So Daniel faced a choice. Obey or disobey. Live or die. Be true to who he is, or become less. It is hard to tell the timeline here, but it looks to me like there is no long pondering of what to do – Daniel learns of the decree, goes home, and does what he has done all of his life, he prayed to God, giving thanks, facing Jerusalem, looking towards home, remembering the God of his ancestors who was with him, even in this. He didn't hide his prayers, he doesn't pull the curtain closed on his faith, and by kneeling on what are now 70 or 80 year old knees, he stands tall and courageous for God. God has been faithful to Daniel's not about to doubt God now.

His enemies report Daniel's prayers to King Darius, and the king is greatly distressed, he must have realized his pride and error. By listening to flattery, he has written the death order for his trusted friend and advisor.

Daniel was cast into a pit, an underground chamber of lions, but before a stone is rolled over the lion's den, Darius called to Daniel "May your God, whom you serve continually, rescue you." Then the stone was rolled, the pit was sealed and marked with the King's signet ring, and the king left his friend and adviser in a torture chamber and tomb, and Darius had a sleepless night.

Daniel made his choice – he chose to pray, and it seems like he would be the lion's prey. This story is so familiar, you most likely know how it ends, but as the den was shut, as the stone was rolled, as the light went dim and the end seemed near, Daniel didn't know what the outcome would be. Not unlike his friends Shadrack, Meshach and Abednego in the fiery furnace, he knelt to no one but God, not to any human powers, but to the Lord of the Universe. He would worship God only, even if it cost him everything. He would trust God, even if he died. How about you – there is so much out there that can devour you – so many temptations, so much that is false and evil, so much that the evil one can make look good. You need to watch it, or you can be eaten alive. In 1 Peter 5:8, Peter gave a firm warning about the evil one: "Be sober-minded; be watchful. Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour." Peter says that Satan wants to devour and destroy you, just like a roaring and hungry lion. Daniel chose to be prey rather than dishonor his God and worship a man.

Daniel 6:19-23 At the first light of dawn, the king got up and hurried to the lions' den. When he came near the den, he called to Daniel in an anguished voice, "Daniel, servant of the living God, has your God, whom you serve continually, been able to rescue you from the lions?" Daniel answered, "O king, live forever! My God sent his angel, and he shut the mouths of the lions. They have not hurt me, because I was found innocent in his sight. Nor have I ever done any wrong before you, O king." The king was overjoyed and gave orders to lift Daniel out of the den. And when Daniel was lifted from the den, no wound was found on him, because he had trusted in his God.

God had protected Daniel, Daniel wasn't alone, an angel had been with him, keeping the lions from killing him. Daniel was innocent, and was lifted from this den and was restored to power because he trusted God. Those who plotted against him had a gristly end – you probably didn't hear this in Sunday School – the evil doers, those who are jealous and who defy God, are thrown to the lions, along with their wives and children. Scripture says they were killed by the lions, attacked before they even hit the floor. Sadly, the innocent suffer for the sin and defiance of the proud.

Darius then issued a new proclamation – that all people must revere and fear the God of Daniel, saying Daniel's God is a living God, he endures forever, his kingdom will not be destroyed. His dominion will never end. He rescues, saves, performs signs and wonders, and he saves his people. That's the same God who cares for you. God has not changed. I don't know what lions stalk you, but I pray that you have the courage to face them, because of your faith in a living and loving God, who is with you in the lion's den, with you in the darkness, with you as you do what is right.

And maybe we can fear the lions in our lives less. No doubt, they are there, but there is another, more powerful Lion there as well. A Lion that is looking out for you. The Lion of Judah, Jesus Christ, the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. He went into the pit of a cold tomb, a stone was rolled over the entry, the tomb was signed and sealed and guarded, and it looked like the end. But evil could not overcome the love of God, death didn't have the victory, the Lion of Judah roared over death and evil and what looked like the end was the beginning. It takes courage to face this Lion, Jesus, the Christ, but face Him anyway, in Him find hope, and life, and be blessed. Amen and amen.
