# CONGREGATIONAL CARE - THANKSGIVING DINNER - TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 16

Many thanks to the Congregational Care Committee under the direction of Susan Strobel and John Duchon for the work on the annual Thanksgiving Dinner for Senior Citizens. Due to precautions issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the church will be hosting a drive through- take out dinner again this year. We simply do not have enough space to safely distance and host this as a sit-down dinner. Last year many chose to eat their dinners together with friends off campus, and we encourage all who are comfortable to do the same this year. The invitation for the dinner will be coming out in a few weeks. If you are a senior citizen (over 70 years of age) and are unsure if you are on the invitation list, please call the church office. If you would like to serve on the committee who will prepare for this dinner, please be in touch as well.

There are some sayings we all have heard, and we know what they mean, but we might not know where they came from. For instance - giving someone a cold shoulder - it means being unwelcoming, dissing someone. In medieval England, it was customary to give a guest a cold piece of meat from the shoulder of mutton when the host felt it was time for the guest to leave. This was a polite way to communicate, "Go home, now." The phrase "red tape" comes from the days when official documents were bound with red tape. A blue moon is the second full moon in a single calendar month, and it's a rare occurrence, so once in a blue moon means something that doesn't happen very often. Maybe you've been part of a white elephant gift exchange at Christmas. Albino elephants were highly regarded and lavishly cared for in Asia, but very expensive and burdensome to keep. To give someone a white elephant gift means off-loading something you don't want, and putting the burden on them. This is church, so we know the term "potluck". In the past all kinds of food went into a big cooking pot, and as you sat down to eat, you had to take 'pot luck' and could never be quite sure what you would be served. Many of the saying we use have their origins in the Bible, such as turning the other cheek, taking someone one under your wing, setting our teeth on edge, and even eat, drink, and be merry!

We have been studying the Old Testament book of Daniel, and his story of courage are very relevant for today. Daniel and his friends were captives in Babylon, and eventually, due to their faith in God, they became wise men for the various Kings and rulers of the Babylonian empire. We've seen how they remembered who they were, that God could use them as they were, that it took courage to take a stand for God, and from King Nebuchadnezzar we learned that it takes courage to admit you're wrong.

Today we are going to look at how it takes courage to read the handwriting on the wall. When you hear that phrase, what does it make you think? It means that you've noticed signs or indications that something is about to happen, and usually that something is bad. The handwriting on the wall means misfortune is pending. For example: No one told him he was going to be fired, but for months he had seen the handwriting on the wall.

This saying comes from the 5th chapter of Daniel. King Nebuchadnezzar had died, the golden kingdom which he had reigned over had ended, and lesser kingdoms followed. Nebuchadnezzar was quite a character, but also willing to learn, grow, and change as he encountered the Most-High God of Daniel. Nebuchadnezzar's sin was his pride, his misguided sense of accomplishment. But he eventually acknowledged his sin and confessed to God. His successor, the new king, is his son or grandson Belshazzar. Belshazzar is guilty of another kind of sin – the sin of defiance. Belshazzar defies God, is contemptuous towards all that is God's, and he pays for it when Daniel reads the handwriting on the wall. Here's what happened:

5 King Belshazzar gave a great banquet for a thousand of his nobles and drank wine with them. 2 While Belshazzar was drinking his wine, he gave orders to bring in the gold and silver goblets that Nebuchadnezzar his father had taken from the temple in Jerusalem, so that the king and his nobles, his wives and his concubines might drink from them. 3 So they brought in the gold goblets that had been taken from the temple of God in Jerusalem, and the king and his nobles, his wives and his concubines drank from them. 4 As they drank the wine, they praised the gods of gold and silver, of bronze, iron, wood and stone.

The disrespect, the defiance in this act is huge. This is a sacrilege. Imagine how this would make God's people feel, the vessels from the Temple in Jerusalem, are being passed around like beer cups. These items that were sacred, are being profaned. And then still worse, Belshazzar and his nobles, wives, and concubines are toasting to their gods of metal, wood, and stone. It was sickening – this was such defiance and irreverence; it was like spitting in the eye of God. Usually the sacred vessels of a conquered nation were treated with respect. Imagine if our communion dishes were used for a party, if the crosses, Bibles, or our stained glass were mocked. God was being insulted by Belshazzar. These things made for God's honor and for worship are being misused, but the huge sin here is mocking God. Galatians 6:7 in the Amplified Bible says:

Do not be deceived, God is not mocked [He will not allow Himself to be ridiculed, nor treated with contempt nor allow His precepts to be scornfully set aside]; for whatever a man sows, this and this only is what he will reap.

God is not mocked or ridiculed, and God acts. We read then in Daniel 5:5 Suddenly the fingers of a human hand appeared and wrote on the plaster of the wall, near the lampstand in the royal palace. The king watched the hand as it wrote. 6 His face turned pale and he was so frightened that his legs became weak and his knees were knocking. 7 The king summoned the enchanters, astrologers and diviners. Then he said to these wise men of Babylon, "Whoever reads this writing and tells me what it means will be clothed in purple and have a gold chain placed around his neck, and he will be made the third highest ruler in the kingdom."

8 Then all the king's wise men came in, but they could not read the writing or tell the king what it meant.

A moment ago there had been revelry, drunkenness, wild toasts, now Belshazzar is terrified. A disembodied hand wrote on the wall, leaving Belshazzar pale and shaken. He must have learned something from his father King Nebuchadnezzar, because he sent for wise men and offers a bribe or reward if they can tell him what all of this meant. And as before, the wisemen had no idea. This scared him even more. Daniel 5:10 describes how the Queen Mother – perhaps Nebuchadnezzar's wife, told Belshazzar to ask for Daniel who had given Nebuchadnezzar good counsel. Daniel was filled with the spirit of his holy God. Belshazzar should call for Daniel, Daniel would know what the writing meant. Daniel 5 continues 13 So Daniel was brought before the king, and the king said to him, "Are you Daniel, one of the exiles my father the king brought from Judah? 14 I have heard that the spirit of the gods is in you and that you have insight, intelligence and outstanding wisdom. 15 The wise men and enchanters were brought before me to read this writing and tell me what it means, but they could not explain it. 16 Now I have heard that you are able to give interpretations and to solve difficult problems. If you can read this writing and tell me what it means, you will be clothed in purple and have a gold chain placed around your neck, and you will be made the third highest ruler in the kingdom."

Belshazzar seems to have regained his composure because his attitude and language towards Daniel are full of scorn. Daniel is an old man now, but he had been respected and trusted by Nebuchadnezzar. Belshazzar treats him with contempt, like a captive boy, making sure to put Daniel in his place as an exile. Nebuchadnezzar had learned to praise and honor the God of Daniel – but his son speaks of Daniel's God as one of the myriads of gods of Babylon. Twice Belshazzar said, "I have heard", and it sounds like mockery, like a test, like he is interrogating Daniel as if he were a prisoner. Daniel answers with dignity, not wanting any reward, as any ability he has to interpret is a gift from God, so he rejects the gifts and distinctions that Belshazzar offers. Daniel 5:17 continues:

Then Daniel answered the king, "You may keep your gifts for yourself and give your rewards to someone else. Nevertheless, I will read the writing for the king and tell him what it means. 18 "Your Majesty, the Most High God gave your father Nebuchadnezzar sovereignty and greatness and glory and splendor. 19 Because of the high position he gave him, all the nations and peoples of every language dreaded and feared him.

Daniel goes on to describe how Nebuchadnezzar was humbled by God, and then restored to even greater glory by God. He then says: 22 "But you, Belshazzar, his son, have not humbled yourself, though you knew all this. Belshazzar does not measure up to his father Nebuchadnezzar. Instead, Belshazzar had set himself up against the Lord of heaven, dishonoring God by using the Temple dishes for an orgy, praising false gods, not honoring the One True God who holds Belshazzar's life in His hands. So God sent the hand that wrote a message to Belshazzar: v. 25

25 "This is the inscription that was written: mene, mene, tekel, parsin 26 "Here is what these words mean:

Mene: God has numbered the days of your reign and brought it to an end.

27 Tekel: You have been weighed on the scales and found wanting.

28 Peres: Your kingdom is divided and given to the Medes and Persians."

Mene, mene – this word is repeated for emphasis it means numbered – God had numbered the days of Belshazzar's kingdom. It was time for reckoning, Belshazzar's evil had been tallied, had been counted, all of the arrogance and defiance had been heard by God, and has been appraised by God. God is the judge – and God would judge.

**Tekel** – This word means **weighed**. Belshazzar was a light weight; he had been weighed on the scales of justice and doesn't measure up. He had chosen this, choosing to be disdainful and arrogant. He didn't take his rule seriously, and now he would pay the price.

Peres is a reference to Persia – Belshazzar had his chance, abused it, and now his reign is over, the great empire of Babylon will fall, and will be divided. God's final verdict, his judgment is in one word – Persia, Babylon's enemies will conquer and divide what Belshazzar thought was his forever. Numbered, weighed, divided. Belshazzar's reign ended that night – Daniel 5:30: 30 That very night Belshazzar, king of the Babylonians, was slain, 31 and Darius the Mede took over the kingdom, at the age of sixty-two. There is an interesting little math problem in this handwriting on the wall. The words on the wall also means weights, as in measurements. Belshazzar did not measure up. But if you add the value of these weights together, they equal 62, the same age as Darius, Darius brings fruition to God's warning.

There is a warning for us in this as well, friends. God is serious about sin. So serious He sent Jesus as a sacrifice to clean us up and make it possible for us, His children, to be forever with Him. God hates sin. We were not made for sin, we were made for life, abundant life, and so often we turn from life and light and choose the darkness and the shadows. The evil one tries to convince us that's where we'll find meaning and truth, but all that is there are lies, and despair, and bitterness, and pain. Why would we go there? Why do we turn from God? We all do it. So many people are very angry these days, but how much of that is righteous anger? How many people are seeking God's justice, kindness, and goodness? Why do we choose what is wrong? Why do we try to take the place of God and judge one another so harshly?

The book of Daniel is about courage. But it is also about the power and grotesqueness of human evil. Evil feeds on evil, sin causes more sin. As these kingdoms of the Old Testament turn from God, they devour one another, none of them last long. Babylon falls to Persia and the Medes, Persia falls to Greece, Greece falls to Rome. The source of all of this is the evil one's great weapon – human pride, pride that reaches gigantic proportions, pride that takes down the guilty and hurts the innocent. We'll look further at the warfare of good and evil in two weeks in Daniel's visions, but I don't think that spiritual warfare ended thousands of years ago. It is still right here, there is a battle within each of us.

So I would suggest that you look at your own wall. What would God write to you? We all know our days are numbered, we all know we are light weights when it comes to resisting evil, we know we do not measure up to be the people God made us to be. We should wonder what our outcome will be. What is the state of our souls – can we be conquered and divided in our love and loyalty to Jesus?

Look to your own wall. What would God write to warn you? What, or who, have you misused? You haven't profaned a goblet from the Temple of Jerusalem, but what have you profaned? God's name? As I said last week, pastors don't preach much about sin these days because no one wants to be reminded that they are a sinner. Well, I can't do that. I know what a sinner I am, I know my days are numbered, that I don't measure up, and that I need a Savior so as to not be conquered or divided. You need the same. We all need to examine our lives, and look at how we dishonor God, not to feel shame, but to admit our guilt, to ask for forgiveness, to receive God's love, to be able to claim life, that life abundance that God offers us in Christ.

That is our courage lesson from Daniel chapter 5 today- to find the courage to look within, to look at what God would write on our wall. God loves us enough to say "enough" – that God wants us forever, so turn from wrongdoing, confess sin, don't be a Belshazzar and think you're above God. If God is serious about sin, He is also serious about love. And God put that in writing. There is something God has already written about you that I would like to close with, something I hope you'll remember. Your name is written on the hand of God. "I have written your name on the palms of My hands" God says in Isaiah 49:16. Your name, you are written on God's hands, He never forgets you, He never gives up on you, and through Jesus He gives you a hand up to be part of His family, His Kingdom, His joy. Have the courage to look at what God writes on your wall, and heed it. And then remember your name is written on the palm of the hand of God, your life is in God's hands, there is a place for you at God's table, there is a spot for you in God's heart. Find the courage to look at your own wall and see what God writes to you. And then look at the hands of God, see, there it is – there is your name. Hold on to the truth that you are deeply loved and valued by your God. Put that in your heart. Amen and amen.
