


FUNDRAISING

5.9.2021 SERMON: YOUR CISTERN

Have you ever felt like life was in the pits? I dearly loved the show "Parks and Recreation" set in the made up town of Pawnee, Indiana, and the ongoing saga of "Lot 48" or simply "the pit,". The pit was originally dug by a developer, but after going bankrupt in the middle of the construction, the project was abandoned and left behind this giant hole, which became a plot line in many episodes of this show: people fall in the pit, tent in the pit, garden in the pit. Eventually, many seasons later, the pit is filled in and made into a lovely community park. One of the characters, Andy Dwyer, writes a song about the pit after he fell in and broke both legs. The lyrics to the song are memorable:

The pit. I fell in the pit. You fell in the pit. We all fell in the pit. The pit. If you didn't know that song, you might recall this one from the show Hee Haw: Doom, despair and agony on me, deep dark depression, excessive misery. If it weren't for bad luck, I'd have no luck at all.

Andy and the cast of Hee Haw are right – there are times when we all feel like we have fallen into a pit, tumbled down a well, ended up at the bottom of a cistern. Today we are beginning a sermon series from the book of Genesis on the life of Joseph, the favored son of Jacob and Rachel. It may seem like an odd choice for Mother's Day. But motherhood is both glorious and hard. When you've had a child, you've given away part of your heart, and it is hard when your child is in the pit, your heart is right there with them. There are a lot of lessons for all kinds of moms, dads, sons, and daughters from Joseph's family of one dad, 4 mothers, and 12 brothers. This story is full of family dysfunction and parental favoritism, but it is also a really good story of faith, trust, and integrity. Joseph's story teaches us about the ever present goodness of God, and how God can create something beautiful out of the messes in our lives.

A number of us are reading the Max Lucado book – "You'll get through this" a book that offers hope and help for our own turbulent times, and Max uses Joseph's story to show how God will help us and our loved ones out of troubled times. I have yet to meet a person whose life hasn't bottomed out at some point. It can be hard to see the way out of trouble, or to hold on to hope, when you're at the bottom of a cistern. In every chapter of Joseph's story, Max Lucado refers to this statement, which we will refer to every week in this sermon. I invite you to read aloud with me: With God's help, I'll get through this. It won't be painless. It won't be quick. But God will use this mess for good. In the meantime I won't be foolish or naïve. But I won't despair either. With God's help I will get through this.

Every person who has ever lived has had some "this" to get through. This is not the first pandemic that humanity has dealt with. This is not the first time we've seen prices rise and or lived with political division. What we are going through is not unique. And here's the thing, none of this is a surprise to God. God knows what pit you feel stuck in, God knows how trapped you might feel, God knows how overwhelmed you are. You might feel trapped in family troubles, and you'll see that the story of Joseph could be the story of any of our families. Has it ever seemed to you that some families are perfect, they have it all together, and fortune always shines on them? Every family has seasons of struggles and joys, good days and tough times, every family has issues and victories.

Joseph's family had all of the troubles you could think of – and yet God saw something in this family of one dad, 4 mothers, and 12 sons, God saw something in their pettiness, their rivalry, their brokenness, and looked at them and said – yes! God still looks at broken people, messed up families, and see something of hope, and says yes to people like you and me. Let's dive in - let's see what Genesis says about this family, beginning Jacob, who is given the name Israel by God, he is the son of Isaac, the grandson of Abraham, he's a man with a big family:

- 37 Jacob lived in the land where his father had stayed, the land of Canaan. 2 This is the account of Jacob's family line. Joseph, a young man of seventeen, was tending the flocks with his brothers, the sons of Bilhah and the sons of Zilpah, his father's wives, and he brought their father a bad report about them.
- 3 Now Israel loved Joseph more than any of his other sons, because he had been born to him in his old age; and he made an ornate[a] robe for him. 4 When his brothers saw that their father loved him more than any of them, they hated him and could not speak a kind word to him.
- 5 Joseph had a dream, and when he told it to his brothers, they hated him all the more. 6 He said to them, "Listen to this dream I had: 7 We were binding sheaves of grain out in the field when suddenly my sheaf rose and stood upright, while your sheaves gathered around mine and bowed down to it."

8 His brothers said to him, "Do you intend to reign over us? Will you actually rule us?" And they hated him all the more because of his dream and what he had said.

- 9 Then he had another dream, and he told it to his brothers. "Listen," he said, "I had another dream, and this time the sun and moon and eleven stars were bowing down to me."
- 10 When he told his father as well as his brothers, his father rebuked him and said, "What is this dream you had? Will your mother and I and your brothers actually come and bow down to the ground before you?" 11 His brothers were jealous of him, but his father kept the matter in mind.
- 12 Now his brothers had gone to graze their father's flocks near Shechem, 13 and Israel said to Joseph, "As you know, your brothers are grazing the flocks near Shechem. Come, I am going to send you to them."
- "Very well," he replied.
- So Joseph went after his brothers and found them near Dothan. 18 But they saw him in the distance, and before he reached them, they plotted to kill him.
- 19 "Here comes that dreamer!" they said to each other. 20 "Come now, let's kill him and throw him into one of these cisterns and say that a ferocious animal devoured him. Then we'll see what comes of his dreams."
- 21 When Reuben heard this, he tried to rescue him from their hands. "Let's not take his life," he said. 22 "Don't shed any blood. Throw him into this cistern here in the wilderness, but don't lay a hand on him." Reuben said this to rescue him from them and take him back to his father.
- 23 So when Joseph came to his brothers, they stripped him of his robe—the ornate robe he was wearing— 24 and they took him and threw him into the cistern. The cistern was empty; there was no water in it.

Like Joseph, we all have the bright colored chapters in our lives. As a pastor I feel very humbled and honored to celebrate life with you. You invite me to preside at your weddings, to come to your gradation open house, to go to your baby shower. You've asked me to do a house blessing as you move into your new home, you invite me to your retirement celebration. Thank – you, it is a privileged to do life with you on those high and holy days, those days of many colors when God is in his heaven and all is right with the world. I pray that everyone one of you is headed into more bright and brilliant days and seasons.

And then there are those other days and seasons, when you're at your lowest, and you ask me to come to the hospital room, and we pray for healing and hope. You call and quietly ask for help- to get counseling for a family situation, to help pay a bill, to find out when the support group meets next. Then there are those calls when you need to talk out your anger, at the loss of the job, at an injustice done to you, or to work through a betrayal. And then there are the calls – day or night – asking me to come and meet with you, someone you love has just died, and you do not know what to do. And then the aftershocks of grief, loss, sadness. We've all been there – the great days of living, and those days or seasons when we are at the bottom of the well, in our cistern. Being in the cistern hurts no matter what – you've fallen, you're in a low space, at a low time in your life. It is harder still if you were tossed in against your will and didn't see this coming. And it is the hardest when the person who shoved you in is a family member or a friend.

You wonder – how do I get through this? The evil one will whisper to you – you won't. You won't make it. There is no going up or coming out of this. And you might start to believe that, and you may not even be able to rise and see that there is light above you. Joseph knew that feeling, he took a hard fall as he was thrown into the cistern, Was it his fault? Maybe. I would imagine life with 11 brothers and 4 Moms would be challenging. He was dad's favorite, but did he lord that over his 10 older brothers too much? Joseph saw himself as special, and his dreams reinforced that. The dreams were a glimpse of his destiny, of being in a very high place. But telling his brothers and father the dreams might have been a mistake. That they would bow to him was bad enough, but that the sun, moon, and stars would also bow was too much. This chapter of Joseph's story reminds us that we need to think before we speak – and maybe to ask ourselves – Does this need to be said? Does this need to be said by me? Does this need to be said now? Joseph spoke up when silence would have been a better path. In Genesis 37 we read his brothers hated him, hated him all the more, could not speak a kind word to him, were jealous of him, even his dad Jacob rebuked him -pretty much saying enough already. Joseph said things he shouldn't have, and he paid for it.

Sometimes we fall into the pit, sometimes we are thrown into the cistern, other times we have dug the hole ourselves, jumped in, and then wonder "how did I get here?". Joseph's words helped dig the hole he found himself in. In your cistern, when you've hit bottom and are bruised and scared, you have the chance to stop, and think. Maybe you feel guilt and shame because you know your fault in creating the hole you're in. Maybe you're angry with God or with someone you thought should have stopped you from falling in the pit. Maybe you're wondering what you did that caused someone to throw you this curve ball and toss you into your cistern. That's the thing with the cisterns in life – you don't see them coming, you can't prepare for them. You feel so abandoned and alone, and there is so much uncertainty when you're at the bottom. But here is the good news, whatever your cistern, God is there, there with you at the depths of hurt, and there above you lighting the way out.

Joseph's story is a warning that there are cisterns out there that can bring your happy life to a screeching halt. That is simply life on earth, no one has been able to avoid hurt and pain, and the massive suffering that humanity has experienced in the pandemic has stretched from Iceland to South Africa, from the West Indies to Eastern Europe. COVID has shown us human pain on a scale I could not have dreamt. We may have been strolling along, thinking life was easy, a breeze, and that is another of the evil one's lies. Falling into false security, thinking you're safe in your wealth and health is not what the Bible teaches. Scripture is full of the lives of people who suffered for their faith in God. Christ Himself is known as the Suffering Servant. The Bible tells of families who fight, people who lose all they own, or suffer with terrible diseases. There are stories of parents who suffer when their baby dies, wives and husbands who must deal with the death of their spouse, people who have nothing to eat or drink. Christians know that following Jesus doesn't mean there are no cisterns out there.

When we are in the cistern, we are not alone. One of the amazing things that we will see each week in Joseph's story, is that God was always with him, and Joseph was well aware of the presence of God. Even in the pit, he knew he was God's, and that whatever happened God did not leave him, that God would use these circumstances he found himself in for God's glory. Joseph trusts God, and every time Joseph falls, God helps him rise again. Later, in Genesis chapter 50, verse 19 – Joseph will tell his brothers that what they had done, intending to harm him, God intended for good. That is the way of God. Think about some of the cisterns you've found yourself in – what did you learn as you were in that pit? How did God use that experience to shape you, to grow you? Think about the person who maybe had a hand in putting you there. Did you forgive them? Can you see how what someone might have meant for evil in your life God can turn to good? God uses all things for good, as God is nothing but good. Romans 8:28 reminds us And we know that God works all things together for the good of those who love Him, who are called according to His purpose.

Think about your cistern, what good did God show you through that bad situation, in that terrible season of your life? God doesn't cause bad things to happen to us, not ever, but God can take the evil in the world, the pain in our lives, and makes something beautiful. No matter how long you have been following God, you're not finished growing in Christ. You can still be more than you are now, and God will take each downturn, each stumble, each fall, and shape you and further form you into the image of Jesus His Son. That doesn't mean we welcome trouble or go hunting for pain, but when it comes, we can weather it, we can get through this, because God is with us, and will use this pain and sorrow for our good.

It would be natural to want revenge on the people who have thrown us into the cistern, but I have never seen anyone grow happier or healthier by holding on to judgement, resentment, anger, or bitterness. Jesus instead tells us to love our enemies and bless those who curse us. God tells us that vengeance belongs to Him and Him alone. The Apostle Paul tells us if our enemies are hungry, we should feed them, if our enemies are thirsty, we should give them something to drink. It is hard to remain at odds if you eat and drink with someone. Instead, conversation might begin, understanding might be gained, compassion could be offered, and forgiveness could come about.

I do not know what your "this" is – but I do know, no matter how deep your cistern, you can get out when you look above, trust God, and do what God tells you to do. You'll get through this. It won't be painless. It won't be quick. But God will use this mess for good. In the meantime, don't be foolish or naïve. But don't despair either. With God's help, you will get through this. Amen and amen.
