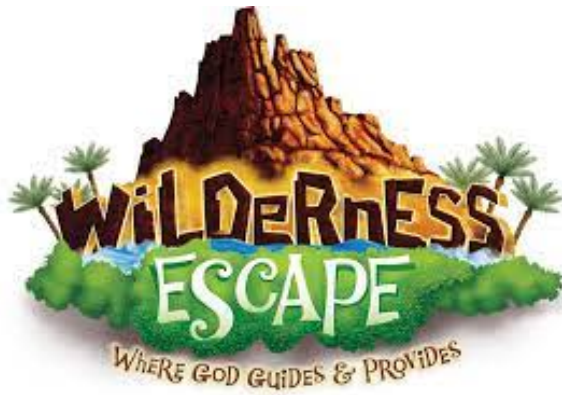
# CHILDRENS MINISTRIES

## 5.23.2021 SERMON – ENDINGS AND BEGINNINGS

Peace of Christ be with you! For those of you who don't know me, my name is Michael Dirksen and I am the High School youth leader here at Cascade Christian Church, and today, on this graduation Sunday, I have the honor of preaching. So while this message is definitely geared towards all of our high school graduates and their families, I hope that you all will be able to relate to it in one way or another.

One of my favorite poets is a man by the name of T.S. Elliot. I find his poetry both thought-provoking and mysterious. One of my favorite quotes of his simply says "In my end is my beginning." Appropriately that the last line of the poem, but it certainly makes you think. Today, being graduation Sunday, I think many of us are thinking about endings.

Whether you graduated from high school this week, had a child graduate from high school this week, or it's been 70 years since you graduated from high school – we can all think back on a time – maybe even that time is now – when a period of our lives comes to an end. Today we celebrate the ending of a time in our high schoolers' lives – the end of K-12 education and moving on to a new chapter. But I am sure that is not the only thing ending happening this day, week, month, or year. Some of you may be ending a job and starting a new one. Others of you may be moving, which represents an end in its own right. And still, others may be experiencing other types of endings. As we reach whatever end you may be facing, it also means it is time for a new beginning. For some of the high school graduates, you are spending the summer working and preparing for college in the fall. For others, you are jumping right into the workforce. For our non-high school graduates, you may be moving into a period where you have one less kid living at home, you may be starting a new job, or moving into a new home. God willing – it feels like we are turning the page on the pandemic and beginning post-pandemic life. And while that end might feel more celebratory than others, it still represents the end of one time in our lives and moving onto something new. One thing is certain about these new beginnings: this is the end of one time in your life and the beginning of a new time. Like High School or whatever just ended, the next phase of your life is certain to come with some trials, ups, downs, and everything in between.

Speaking directly to our high schoolers – as you prepare to go into whatever is next for you, whether you're excited to break out of the West Michigan bubble, or anxious to do so, you're going to take a lot of things with you from growing up here in West Michigan at Cascade Christian Church. There are some ridiculous things I hope you remember fondly like all the games, being chased with the earth ball, the regatta's, the color wars, lock-ins, jazzercise to 80s music, all the pranks, and so many other things that would take me too long to recount. I also hope that amidst all of those fun memories, even outside of the Sunday school lessons and weeks up at camp, you learned what it is like to trust in and be in a relationship with God.

So now, you might ask, what does a relationship with God have to say about endings and beginnings? Actually, quite a bit. In Psalm 139 the bible says **"In your book were written all the days that were formed for me, when none of them as yet existed. 17 How weighty to me are your thoughts, O God! How vast is the sum of them! 18 I try to count them—they are more than the sand; I come to the end[a]—I am still with you."**

For the high schoolers, your time in high school has come to an end. It is easy to dwell on endings as they imply significant change, which inevitably translates to loss. It means that what we had will never be exactly the way that it was before. Our schedules change. Our priorities change. Our friends change. And that's just the beginning. We come to the end, and it is a loss even as it is a promise for a new beginning. But the Psalmist reminds us that being in a relationship with God means one thing doesn't change. The Psalmist says **"I come to the end – I am still with you."** This is the knowledge that I want you to leave here with today – that God, no matter what else ends, is still with you. It is the knowledge that wherever you go, whatever you do, whatever happens to you, God is still with you. It is the knowledge of two fundamental things about God that you need to know before you leave here today. The first is simply this: God knows you. It's easy to get lost in the profoundness of this truth -- that the God who placed all the stars in the sky knows you. Many of you have heard this truth since you started going to Sunday school here. So wherever you go, whatever beginning starts with this chapter ending, you're going to a place where, still, you are known. That's the first truth I want you to take away from today.

The second bit of knowledge that this psalmist gives us is that the God of the universe will not only know you in this ending and a new beginning, but he also wants to be in a relationship with you. That a being in the universe who knows everything about you – wants to be in a relationship with you. But to have the God of the world not only know you but also be with you in this time as in all times should be of great comfort. Earlier in that same Psalm, the writer says **“Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence? If I go up to the heavens, you are there; if I make my bed in the depths, you are there. If I rise on the wings of the dawn, if I settle on the far side of the sea, even there your hand will guide me, your right hand will hold me fast. If I say, “Surely the darkness will hide me and the light become night around me,” even the darkness will not be dark to you; the night will shine like the day, for darkness is as light to you.”** Paul, in Romans, puts it this way: **“I’m absolutely convinced that nothing –nothing living or dead, angelic or demonic, today or tomorrow, high or low, thinkable or unthinkable—absolutely nothing can get between us and God’s love because of the way that Jesus our Master has embraced us.”**

Now, it's easier to say that God is with us and knows us now, at the end, when we are comfortable. It might be easier to understand it in our minds now than it will be whenever that new beginning starts. And, in reality, sometimes during those new beginnings, it's just a matter of putting one foot in front of the other. However, the bible does offer some further comfort during those difficult beginnings as well. Our savior's own life is an example of this. When Jesus died on the cross and was buried in the tomb, it was an ending. An ending of the old covenant. An ending to the rituals of sacrifice. An ending to the way things used to be. And it was not easy. The night before Jesus asked if there was another way, and on the cross, Jesus called out to God in anguish. But then, you know the story, Easter morning pointed to a new relationship, a new beginning, a new way things are. And God was still there. In fact, when you start to think about it, so many things in our lives mirror this truth. It being springtime right now, it's easy to see new beginnings all around us, leaves on the trees, gardens starting to pop, but all of that new life started by burying part of an old plant. A seed was buried and outburst new life. We could take this example further, but I think you get the point. Endings always point to new beginnings. Jesus calls us to join in this cycle when he tells us to die to ourselves and our old ways **SO THAT** we can have a new life, a better more fulfilling life in a relationship with him. In the book of John, it says **“I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world, you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world.”** Today, when you're facing a daunting beginning and a bittersweet ending, take heart, because God has overcome the world.

I don't know where you're going. I don't know what the circumstances will be when you get there. But what I do know that wherever you go, whatever you do, whomever you meet, God is with you. To paraphrase the psalmist: there is no college, no business, no success, no failure, no disappointment, no achievement, no despair, no joy, where you will ever be separated God by your side. And that is why you cannot always judge your reality simply based upon how you feel, because even in the darkest of times, God is with you. In endings and beginnings, God is with you.

I will close by saying: the road ahead of you is open. While the world tells us that faith in Christ can limit & constrain you, knowing that you have a savior who knows you, wants to be in a relationship with you and who has already overcome any obstacle you might face, is the most liberating way to tackle the biggest challenges ahead. So as you embark on this next journey of your life may you be comforted by a savior who is with you at this ending, will be with you in your new beginning who came before you, and has already overcome any challenge you might face.
