
KEYS AT CASCADE CHRISTIAN CHURCH

We do not forget those who have gone before us. May God lift the hearts of all who grieve, all who mourn, all who need comfort. However your heart is broken, let's not forget, the Lord God is here. The thoughts, pictures, and meditations have been so moving, so touching today, and I want to thank Fay Johnson, Bob VanStrien, Marsha Steensma, Kathy Bird and Mark DeYoung, and Chuck and Barb Dykhuizen for their leadership and witness.

Friends, we need to sorrow, grieve, and mourn in times of loss. And the losses have been many. There are a lot of candles burning today, there are many people we miss. But let's not forget God is here, too. No matter what our sorrow, however deep our pain, God does not leave, and God will get us through this. We are in a sermon series on Joseph's story in Genesis, referencing Max Lucado's book "You'll Get Through This". We all have a "this" – everyone has some area of life that is hurtful and challenging. Our "this" can trap us, our pain can imprison us, troubles can make us feel like there is no way out or up, our grief can lock up our hearts. Joseph's story is a guide on how to deal with pain and loss, lest we forget.

Before we begin looking at scripture, I invite you to read aloud this declaration of hope and confidence in our Lord and God: With God's help I'll get through this. It won't be painless. It won't be quick. But God will use this mess for good. In the meantime, I won't be foolish or naïve, but I won't despair either. With God's help, I will get through this.

What is your "this"? How has life made you feel imprisoned?

- As we observe Memorial Day, some of you may have been or know someone who was a prisoner of war, or maybe you feel imprisoned by combat memories that time has not erased, or post-traumatic stress disorder from war.
- You're not in prison, but you might be in debt, infertile, in limbo, in search of a job home or spouse, or in mourning for a parent, spouse, child, sibling, or friend.
- Maybe you feel locked up by a betrayal from a family member or friend, or locked in with addiction or economic hardship
- Or maybe it is the prison of loneliness, of being misunderstood, the prison of being judged, not accepted,
- Or you might have a quiet lock on your heart, silently carrying your pain too hard to even name aloud.

We all have some "this" to get through, we have all felt locked away, and so did Joseph. But God was with Joseph and did not forget this great-grandson of Abraham. Joseph was no longer in Israel, but he was a son of Israel and was not abandoned by God. Some severe tests occurred in Joseph's life that shaped his character and help him depend on God alone. But the imprisonment, the tests, result in a more mature Joseph, who will, by the hand of God, save nations and reconcile with his family. Here's what happens: Genesis 39:1-6

Now Joseph had been taken down to Egypt. Potiphar, an Egyptian who was one of Pharaoh's officials, the captain of the guard, bought him from the Ishmaelites who had taken him there.

The Lord was with Joseph so that he prospered, and he lived in the house of his Egyptian master. When his master saw that the Lord was with him and that the Lord gave him success in everything he did, Joseph found favor in his eyes and became his attendant. Potiphar put him in charge of his household, and he entrusted to his care everything he owned. From the time he put him in charge of his household and of all that he owned, the Lord blessed the household of the Egyptian because of Joseph. The blessing of the Lord was on everything Potiphar had, both in the house and in the field. So Potiphar left everything he had in Joseph's care; with Joseph in charge, he did not concern himself with anything except the food he ate.

Look with me at this passage again - what do you repeatedly see?

- The Lord was with Joseph.
- His master saw the Lord was with him,
- the Lord gave him success in everything he did,
- the Lord blessed the household of the Egyptian because of Joseph,
- the blessing of the Lord was on everything Potiphar had,

God is with Joseph, God has plans for Joseph, and even as uncertainties and hardships rattle Joseph's world, God is at work. Joseph was betrayed by those he trusted, forced to march with captors down to Egypt, and was sold off as property. These things sound like what happens to people during times of war. There is warfare here, the battle is over the role Joseph would play in the future of God's Kingdom. The evil one, Satan, fought to break Joseph, thinking by doing this he could ruin God's plans. To break the line of Abraham is to cut the family tree of the Messiah. To cut this branch, to break Joseph, would most likely, in Satan's eyes, end it all. In this story, a devastating famine would shake the world, and famines have a way of killing off the masses. Satan must have thought ending Joseph, could end Abraham's line, so there would be no Emmanuel, no God with us, no Jesus. But it was not so.

The pampered, favored son of Jacob became a success at running Potiphar's household, growing an agribusiness, managing a large staff. And Joseph knew the success came from God. The slave became his master's right-hand man. Joseph was trusted so much that Potiphar left him in charge of everything. So the evil one tries again - Mrs. Potiphar saw this good-looking, hardworking, successful young man who was her husband's attendant, and wanted attention from him as well. Joseph refused, so she accused, and Joseph was put in Pharaoh's jail. In Genesis 39:20-23 we read: Joseph's master took him and put him in prison, the place where the king's prisoners were confined. But while Joseph was there in the prison, the Lord was with him; he showed him kindness and granted him favor in the eyes of the prison warden. So the warden put Joseph in charge of all those held in the prison, and he was made responsible for all that was done there. The warden paid no attention to anything under Joseph's care, because the Lord was with Joseph and gave him success in whatever he did.

Again, extraordinary success came to Joseph, he was put in charge of the prisoners, and the warden did what Potiphar did, he let Joseph run the place and had no worries. This success came from God. In this passage – look again and see- the Lord was with him, God shows Joseph kindness and granted him favor in the eyes of the warden, God was with him and gave him success in whatever he did.

Joseph was joined in prison by Pharaoh's cupbearer, or butler, and Pharaoh's baker. They had dreams that troubled them. Our dreamer Joseph has grown up he sees these two men and the first words we have recorded from Joseph in prison are words of kindness and empathy – he asks- "Why are your faces so sad today?" The men explain their dreams of three vine branches, grapes, and the wine-cup of Pharaoh, of three baskets, bread, and birds, and asked Joseph to interpret their dreams. Joseph did, but not before telling these men that the power to interpret dreams came from God. The butler's dream meant that in three days he would be back in the place, serving Pharaoh. The baker's dream meant in three days he would be rejected by Pharaoh and killed.

Joseph asked the butler to remember him, that if all went well in the palace, remember him with kindness, and to mention him to Pharaoh, that he had done nothing to deserve being in a dungeon.

The dreams come true, the baker dies, the cupbearer served again at Pharaoh's side. You can imagine the joy of the cupbearer as Joseph prepares for his discharge from prison – "Sure I'll remember you, Joseph, by tomorrow Pharaoh will hear about you. Buddy, I will never forget how much you've helped me, and count on me, I'll be there for you. Pack your bags, you'll be joining me soon!" And you can imagine Joseph, getting his prison possessions together, saying goodbye to the men he had cared for. You can imagine him meeting with the warden to go over a few details on this prisoner, or that schedule. You can imagine Joseph waiting, leaning forward, at the edge of his seat, excited with expectation: Freedom – soon! Justice – Soon! Maybe he could head home to Jacob within the month. But Genesis 40:23 says – "The cupbearer, however, did not remember Joseph; he forgot him." Joseph waited a week to be remembered, to hear the sound of the warden's keys jingling, to be unlocked, to be set free. Joseph waited a month, two months, a year, another year. Genesis 40 ends with the words – he forgot him. The butler forgot all about Joseph! Genesis 41:1 begins by saying – when two full years had passed... two years of being forgotten. Joseph had two more years in his prison. From the end of chapter 40 to the beginning of 41, two years passed. Why did God allow this? Had God forgotten him?

This is a weekend of remembering- lest we forget. You might feel like Joseph with whatever has locked you in, locked down your heart, closed your doors, shut off your hopes, imprisoned your dreams. You might wonder, has God forgotten you? When loved ones died, when soldiers perished, like Captain Waskow that Fay Johnson read about, like Bob VanStrien's classmate – had God forgotten them? In your times of hurt, grief, sorrow, you might feel forgotten. Does God remember you?

Scripture tells us that even in our prolonged suffering - God does not forget. He didn't forget Joseph, and Joseph continued to do the prison work God had given him. He continued to wait on the Lord and God's favor was with him. Nothing indicates that Joseph got bitter, gave up, or cursed God. Whatever else happened in those two years, in that space between the end of Genesis 40 and the beginning of chapter 41, God was with Joseph and Joseph was with God. You may have experienced this - that sometimes God does not give us a quick answer to prayer, we have to wait. In that time of waiting our character can be tested, shaped, formed, matured, honed into who God intends us to be. Waiting can be a challenge. Times of testing are hard - but tests don't last forever. While we wait, God is at work. And Isaiah 40:31 reminds us that those who wait on the Lord Shall renew their strength; They shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint. While you wait, God is working on you, God is working for you. Just wait and see what God will do.

Today, I ask you – do you trust God in times of testing and waiting, in your prison? Friends, we all have areas of our life when we feel or have felt imprisoned and forgotten. But God does not forget, not ever. The time of testing wasn't easy for Joseph, and I know it isn't easy for you. But my guess is, when you look back over your life, you can see how much you grew when the times were tough. God was at work. The Hebrew word for waiting has two meanings – it means to bind, or to weave together, and to look forward. What a great way to think of waiting – God is tying all of this together for our good, weaving something beautiful, that we can lean in towards, with hope, we just have to wait. If you're currently in a tough time of testing, waiting or feeling forgotten, I offer you this as a key to freedom and also as a caution: Bitterness arises in our hearts when we do not trust in the sovereign rule of God in our lives. You have a choice, to let your hard times make your heart bitter, or your faith better.

Your key to freedom is to trust that God in God's sovereignty., that God is who He says He is. In the middle of the word sovereignty, is the word REIGN. God rules, God reigns, and God does not forget or abandon His people. The evil one will try to pull you aside, whispering bitter things to poison your soul. Be a Joseph and don't listen to Satan, stay active with the work God has given you to do. Clearly God is not finished with you – so whatever task God has for you, do it. Do it well. Be faithful even in the smallest of things. Wait for God in your pain, and wait expecting God to weave this altogether for your good, even when you can't see His will. God is sovereign, let God reign, and then watch what God does for you.

Our God is a God of Love, Freedom, and Life. Dreamers and prisoners, you are a child of God, and you'll get through this. By the grace of God your load will be lightened, the depression will be lift, the pain will ease, and you can find joy again. It won't be painless or quick, but God can use your prison for good. Watch God working in your life, and don't despair. Your God fights for you, and your God wins. As you grow in the testing, as you wait in your imprisonment, God remembers you, and God will get you through this. Amen and amen.
